Search is on for local young stars

Nominations are now open for this year's Young People's Civic Awards Scheme.

Gold Award for excellence as new policy approved

Woking Borough Council has been granted a 'Gold Award' in recognition of the way it manages its address information database from the Geospatial Commission.

The Gold Performance Award is only given to authorities that have consistently reached and maintained the highest standards in national tests on data excellence. This is the fourth year in a row the Council has been recognised.

The Council has a legal responsibility to name and number streets and to approve and register official property addresses.

In July, Council approved its Street Naming and Numbering Policy, which provides developers and members of the public with a guide to procedures when determining official street names, property names or numbers.

The purpose is to ensure that new street names, building numbers and names are allocated logically to assist the emergency services, in addition to the effective delivery of post services.


Woking's more than AccessAble!

• **Keep well**: get a flu jab, eat well, drink lots of fluids and keep active.

And don't forget to keep an eye on elderly or frail neighbours, especially during prolonged periods of cold weather.

If you think you'll be cold at home this winter then Action Surrey, working in partnership with Woking Borough Council, can help.


Their team can offer guidance on ways to save energy and money, as well as your eligibility for grant funding.

New swift and bat sign celebrates Woking's twin towns

Woking Town Centre's newest piece of public art was officially opened in July by the Mayor of Woking, Cllr Beryl Hunwicks. The new installation, located by the Civic Offices, provides a nesting chamber for swifts and

bats and commemorates Woking's twin towns.

The installation provides nesting chambers in the upper section, a middle section pointing the way to Woking's twinned towns, all atop a specially engraved, conical stone base, surrounded by planting.

Swifts are a bird species in sharp decline and over the past 20 years the UK's swift numbers have halved. The installation incorporates a system that plays calls to draw the swifts' attention to the boxes, and features webcams to give an insight into nest life.

UK swifts migrate through Europe to spend their winter in Africa, an annual round trip of some 14,000 miles (22,000 km), before returning to breed in the UK during late spring. The stonework base beautifully illustrates this amazing journey.

Woking's twin towns are Le Plessis-Robinson in France and Rastatt in Germany.

Single use plastics policy adopted as climate emergency declared

A policy that sets out Woking Borough Council's commitment to reducing its use of avoidable single use plastics was adopted at its meeting in July.

And in a move of cross-party solidarity, all sides of the Chamber united in declaring a climate emergency in recognition of the catastrophe facing our environment.

Building on a pledge made in March 2018, as part of WWF-UK's Earth Hour, the policy identifies a series of key actions that aim to reduce the use of single use plastics principally through the identification and reduction of avoidable single use plastics across the Council's operations and the promotion of schemes that enable residents,

visitors and local businesses to reduce their use of these plastics.

The policy will form part of the Council's visionary Woking 2050 strategy document, which sets out a roadmap to creating a sustainable borough, whilst reducing our collective impact on the environment.

Site Allocations DPD submitted to Secretary of State for examination

A document identifying land for future development has been submitted to the Secretary of State for independent examination.

The draft Site Allocations Development Plan Document (DPD) identifies potential urban and Green Belt sites for future housing, employment and infrastructure within Woking Borough to ensure it meets its future development requirements.

Woking Borough Council is committed to preparing the document to enable the delivery of its Core Strategy, which was adopted in 2012.

During summer 2015, the Council conducted an initial consultation on its proposals, which attracted over 32,000 individual representations.

A further consultation was undertaken in January 2017 on the suitability of safeguarding land east of Martyrs Lane, which was not taken forward by Council, before a final six week consultation was held in November 2018.

An inspector has now been appointed and the provisional date set (at the time of going to print) for the public examination is from 2 to 13 December at the Council Chamber. The Inspector will write to everyone who made representations confirming the details of the examination.

Woking's pioneers honoured



A memorial to honour the pioneers of Woking's Islamic heritage and history is planned for Woking Town Centre.

Woking is home to the UK's first purpose-built mosque, the Shah Jahan, as well as the Muslim Burial Ground and Peace Garden, and the country's oldest Muslim resting place at Brookwood Cemetery.

These sites reflect the borough's importance on an international stage as the face of British Islam, with a heritage second to none.

Some of the people that will be honoured include the founder of the Shah Jahan Mosque, Dr Gottlieb Leitner; main funder, Begum Shah Jahan of Bhopal; and the first Imam, Khawaja Kamal ud Din.

The memorial will be located along Commercial Way. It is anticipated that works will commence in January and be completed by May 2020.

The memorial forms part of the borough's public art programme and is funded by Victoria Square Woking Limited, designed by Terrafirma Consultancy in partnership with Haven Memorials.

New online housing system to improve services

Woking Borough Council, and housing partner New Vision Homes, are investing in new housing systems that will provide better access to online services.

This involves introducing more self-service and online access for tenants and housing

applicants. It will also improve the existing HomeTrak system currently used to bid for available housing properties.

We aim to implement these improvements towards to end of the year and more information will be provided closer to the time.

Plans for new footbridge granted

Proposals for a new pedestrian and cycle footbridge spanning the Basingstoke Canal have been given the green light by planners.

The new bridge, located adjacent to the existing Chobham Road highway bridge, will unite the two sides of the canal towpath seamlessly without the need for pedestrian and cyclists to cross the busy roads. The work is part of the town centre improvement project which is part funded by Enterprise M3.

The bridge design is aimed to follow the characteristics of the surrounding area and will be similar in style to the striking Bedser Bridge, featuring gabion walls, a non-slip surface, steel handrails with built-in lighting and associated landscaping.

Proprietary works are expected in begin in late autumn with the dewatering of the canal and a comprehensive programme to remove all wildlife safely before works begin in earnest.

During construction works, a short section of towpath between The Living Planet Centre and Chobham Road bridge will be closed. There may also be short periods of highway disruption. Weather permitting, it is expected the new footbridge will be open to the public by summer 2020.



Wear a white ribbon and take the pledge

The United Nations General Assembly has designated 25 November as 'International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women', which is followed by 16 days of global action to bring about systemic change.

In the UK this date is known as White Ribbon Day, led by The White Ribbon Campaign, a not-for-profit organisation that works with men and boys to challenge male cultures that lead to harassment, abuse and violence.

Throughout the year, the White Ribbon campaign aims to recruit volunteer male ambassadors to act as role models, engaging with other men and boys to call out abusive and sexist behaviour among their peers and promote a culture of equality and respect.

In the lead up to 25 November, the Council and White Ribbon Ambassador, Adam Thomas, will be working with local organisations and key male influencers, to raise awareness of White Ribbon Day and encourage residents to engage with the campaign.

Sheerwater transformation underway

Earlier this year, work begun on Canalside, the long-awaited multi-million pound transformation of Sheerwater. The major regeneration project will breathe new life into the area, creating a thriving, sustainable community that meets the changing needs of modern living.

The scheme will see millions of pounds invested into the local area to deliver new and improved housing, roads, open green space, shops, leisure and community facilities.

Modern new homes

The number of homes will double from the current 570 to around 1,200 properties, almost half of which will be affordable housing. The old 1950s housing stock will be replaced with a variety of high quality new homes for rent and sale that are energy efficient and will cater for people through all stages of life.

First class leisure amenities

Works to a new leisure complex at Bishop David Brown boasting a 25-metre swimming pool plus a separate teaching pool, sports hall, studios and a gym has already begun. The outside facilities include a full-size 3G football pitch, and new grass football and rugby pitches.

Once open, the state-of-the-art sports and leisure facilities will be shared between the school and the local community.

Open green space

A large central park area will become the 'green heart' of the new community, putting open space and

nature within easy reach of everyone. Landscaped, tree-lined avenues will link this central space to the Basingstoke Canal to the north and provide attractive routes through the estate that offer additional shared gardens and outdoor space to residents.

Pedestrian friendly

In the new scheme pedestrians and cyclists are given priority over cars, with a network of pathways that will make finding your way around easy. Main vehicle routes are kept to the perimeter of the estate rather than cutting across it.

Facilities for the whole community

An open square will create a 'gateway' to the development, with a new community centre, preschool nursery, health centre, pharmacy and dentist surgery, as well as units for shops and restaurants, with space for outdoor dining. Nearby accommodation for elderly residents puts these amenities on their doorstep.

Neighbourhoods

Canalside will comprise several neighbourhoods with distinct identities, offering a range of houses and apartments of different sizes, from one-bedroom studios to five-bedroom houses.







The emphasis is on family-sized properties designed to offer flexible accommodation with the potential for adaptation to meet specific needs.

Reducing our impact of the environment

A dedicated energy centre will provide heat and power to the leisure centre and to the medium rise residential blocks in the central part of the development. Whilst enhanced insulation, low energy lighting, solar panels, ground source heat-pumps and electric car charging points will all help Canalside minimise its environmental impact.

Upon work commencing, Cllr David Bittleston, Leader of Woking Borough Council, said: "At long last, I'm delighted to say that the regeneration of Sheerwater is underway. We have started the preliminary works for the new leisure centre, swimming pools and sports pitches.

"This £26 million investment in the infrastructure of Sheerwater is, as promised, the first thing we said we would do to start the regeneration process. Not only will it provide residents with brand new sports facilities, it will also provide the school with fantastic new changing and canteen facilities.

"We are committed to investing in Woking. The regeneration of Sheerwater is one of the biggest, most important projects we're undertaking to improve people's lives, create local opportunities and support communities to thrive."

Mark Rolt, Thameswey Developments Ltd's Chief Operating Officer, added: "Canalside marks an exciting new chapter for Sheerwater, transforming it into a highly desirable place to live that will set a new benchmark for building thriving, sustainable communities.

"Demand for housing is a national problem and with Canalside we're providing homes of outstanding





quality in sufficient numbers to allow the existing community to grow. We've worked hard to balance housing density with open space so that people can live and work in a neighbourhood that promotes healthy lifestyles and respects the environment."

Construction

Development of the 74-acre (30 hectare) site will take place in phases to minimise disruption to existing residents and services.

This approach is also taken with open space and other facilities so that there is no loss of public amenities during the development work.

With construction of the leisure facilities underway, works to the first residential phase has begun, providing 92 homes equally split between affordable and open market units.

It is expected that the regeneration scheme will be completed by 2026.

Improving your highway network

Working in partnership, Surrey County Council and Woking Borough Council, through their contractor, Farrans Construction, have embarked on a significant highways improvement project within Woking Town Centre.

The multi-million pound highway improvement project, when complete, will transform the highway network and significantly enhance traffic flow in the area and make it safer for pedestrians and cyclists, whilst stimulating economic growth.

The works range from minor highway adaptations and resurfacing works to improving existing junctions and highway layouts. In addition, Thamsewey will be extending its network of piping to supply clean, green energy to recently completed developments across the town from its new energy station in Poole Road.

Geoff McManus, Woking Borough Council's Associate Director, said: "We recognise that these

works cause significant disruption and we would like to thank local residents and businesses for their patience during this time.

"We are fully committed to keeping Woking Town Centre open for business and disruption to a minimum in order to deliver major highway improvements that will benefit everyone."

It is anticipated all highway works associated with this project will be complete by spring 2021. A table containing details of the major works within the coming months is below.

Hospice care goes way beyond just the building

Woking & Sam Beare Hospice and Wellbeing Care has well and truly settled into its state-of-the-art facility in Goldsworth Park Centre, having been open almost two and a half years. But what many are surprised to learn is that over 70 per cent of the care this charity delivers is in patient homes. So meet the team delivering specialist care in your community.



Your local hospice is a people-centred charity that delivers specialist care to over 2,000 people with life-limiting illnesses and their carers and families each year. The care and support they provide is delivered at the hospice through its Wellbeing Centre for day patients, on the Ward for in-patients, with community care delivered through its Community Teams. These are comprised of Community Nurse Specialists [CNSs], Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists, Counsellors, a Social Worker and specialist Palliative Doctors.

Shelagh Musoke, who heads up the Community Team and is a senior CNS at Woking & Sam Beare, explains: "Hospice care is far more than just treating patient's physical symptoms. Myself and the team all come together to care for our patient's full wellbeing.

"No one day is ever the same, largely because no one patient and their needs are ever the same. My day normally begins in the office to meet with the team and look at the referrals that may have come in and for us to collectively discuss our caseloads. After this we will go out into the community and start our patient visits either in their homes or care or residential home.

Currently we have 560 people on the Community Team's caseload.

"It is our role to ensure that those under our care are looked after in the best possible way, where they want to be and according to their wishes. This is done in collaboration with our healthcare peers, such as the District Nurses and GPs, to ensure the patient and their family have the support they need.

"It depends on the patient's needs to how often we may visit, but the team is always at the end of the phone to offer support, advice and reassurance.

"All of us at the hospice put those we care for at the centre of what we do and it is a huge honour to be part of an organisation that makes such a difference to peoples' lives."

As a charity, Woking & Sam Beare Hospice is reliant on income from its fundraising activities and the sale of goods in its 18 shops. You can support their 2019 appeal by giving the gift of care, and contribute towards funding the services that Shelagh and her team deliver. Enabling them to provide a vital lifeline to so many people who live in your community, these are people that could be your mother, wife, brother or friend.

Out and about

Celebrating some of the most important Muslim heritage sites in Britain, this walking trail takes in the Muslim Burial Ground and Peace Garden, Shah Jahan Mosque, and the country's first Muslim cemetery, located in Brookwood Cemetery. This trail can also be enjoyed by foot or train.

The route

1. Starting from the car park, with your back towards the road. Head through the trees along the worn path towards the Muslim Burial Ground and Peace Garden.

Muslim Burial Ground and Peace Garden

Commissioned in 1915, the site was once the final resting place of 19 Muslim soldiers from the Great War, and a further eight casualties of the Second World War.

After falling into disrepair in the 1960s, the Grade II site was restored in 2015 to create a lasting legacy for the 27 servicemen who paid the ultimate sacrifice to defend Britain.

The Peace Garden was inspired by classic Islamic garden design. Look out for the central water feature, two stone prayer mats and the 27 Indian Silver Birches – one commemorating each fallen soldier.

Although the bodies of the 27 servicemen laid to rest at the site were later reinterred at Brookwood Military Cemetery in 1969, the Muslim Burial Ground remained sacred land.



- 2. After spending time in the quiet and tranquil surroundings, return to the car park. Upon reaching the road, bear left over the canal bridge and continue along Monument Road. As you reach a set of miniroundabouts, turn right onto Oriental Road and continue past the Mayer Brown building.
- **3.** You will find yourself at a driveway that leads to the Shah Jahan Mosque. When entering the site please be considerate of worshippers, act and dress respectfully. Do take time to walk around the grounds.

Key facts

Start: Monument Road Car Park, Monument Road, Woking GU21 5LW

Finish: Brookwood Station, Connaught Road, Woking GU24 0ER

Time: 4 hours

Distance: 7 miles (11km) approx (walking route)

Type of walk: Flat, mainly pedestrian footpaths or towpaths, except when accessing the Muslim Burial Ground. This trail includes a short train journey from Woking to Brookwood. Alternatively, you can drive from each notable site of interest.

Shah Jahan Mosque

Commissioned by Gottlieb Wilhelm Leitner to provide a place of worship for Muslim students the mosque was designed by Victorian architect, W. L. Chambers and completed in 1889.

Its green and white dome and minarets are considered one of Woking's landmarks.


Decorative geometric patterns and Arabic calligraphy can be seen on the interior.

Now a Grade I listed building, the mosque welcomes visitors.

Taking the train is less strain

For those of you taking the train, return to Oriental Road and turn right. Continue ahead until reaching Station Approach. The railway station is straight ahead. Hop on a train to Brookwood Station. Journey times are approximately five minutes. Visit **www.nationalrail.co.uk** for train times. Skip to step 5.





4. Return to Oriental Road and retrace your steps back towards the Muslim Burial Ground. Upon reaching the canal bridge, turn left onto the towpath and continue towards Woking Town Centre.

Continue along the towpath towards St Johns and beyond. Upon reaching Brookwood, turn left over the narrow bridge onto Sheets Heath Lane. Continue ahead until reaching Connaught Road. Carefully cross the road. Brookwood Station is directly ahead.

5. Upon reaching Brookwood Station, take the underpass to the cemetery. Alternatively, if arriving by

train exit via the Brookwood Cemetery entrance. Go through the gate and continue ahead before turning right along Pine Avenue.

6. After discovering the cemetery, return to Brookwood Station to catch your train home.

This walking trail is an amalgamation of two trails researched and developed by the Everyday Muslim Heritage & Archive Initiative.

Brookwood Cemetery

Built by the London Necropolis Company in 1854 to receive London's past residents, the cemetery is one of the largest privately-owned burial grounds in Britain and one of the biggest operating cemeteries in Western Europe. Since 1854, over 240,000 people have been laid to rest within its beautiful grounds.

The cemetery comprises approximately 230 acres of burial ground, some of which have been set aside for the use of specific communities and denominations.

In 1884, a Muslim cemetery was established where you'll find many important Muslims buried.

It also contains many remarkable Victorian memorials and graves, and the largest military cemeteries in the country including the World War One American cemetery, the oldest Muslim cemetery and the unique Zoroastrian burial ground.


